The Concurrent Enrollment / Dual Credit Concept

Dual credit courses are college courses that meet or exceed the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills requirements for Texas public schools. High school students may concurrently enroll in Brazosport College with the permission of their high school principal or counselor and the college counselor.

Students are encouraged to participate in the Dual Credit and Concurrent Enrollment Program. Once a student has completed the sophomore year, met minimum passing standards on the TAKS test, and is classified as a junior, he/she is eligible to take a **Texas Success Initiative** approved test (**TSI**), either the THEA (Texas Higher Education Assessment) test or COMPASS test, before registering for college classes (See page 7 for THEA exemptions).

There are three options to taking college courses.

1. High School - as a part of students' high school schedule
2. Evening Classes at Brazosport College or another site – on students' own time
3. Day Class at another high school or BC – requires special permission from the principal and counselor to leave the campus to attend classes during the day

Dual credit classes are college courses for which a student receives both high school and college credit. Dual credit will be received upon successful completion of college courses with a minimum grade of "D". However, some high schools will not grant high school credit for college courses having a grade of "D" – a minimum grade of "C" is required to receive high school credit. Columbia-Brazoria Independent School District (C-BISD) **does not** accept the grade of "D" for college courses. A grade of "**C**" (70) **or better is required** to receive high school credit. Check with the high school or college counselor for more information about credits.

Juniors typically take U.S. History, Psychology, Sociology, Speech, Biology, PE, or computer classes. Seniors take these classes also, plus Government, Math, and English. These are just some of the classes that offer dual credit. There are many more but these are the most popular choices.

A list of college classes approved for dual credit is on page 6 of this guidebook. There is also a list of approved dual credit courses in the Columbia High School Academic Catalog.

Concurrent enrollment means that a student is enrolled in more than one school at the same time. Concurrent enrollment classes are any college course where the student does not receive high school credit. Students receive college credit only for these courses.

Some of the courses that are taken concurrently are college sophomore English, advanced computer technology classes, advanced math courses, office management classes, and may be any course in the college catalog for which the student is eligible.

Students may take up to two college courses each semester. Students requesting more than two college courses, during any given semester, will need special approval from the appropriate college dean and counselor.

Students enrolling in college courses for high school credit should be aware that these are college level courses taught by college faculty. All students, regardless of age or class standing, will be held to the same standards. Grades earned become part of the student's permanent record at Brazosport College.

Student Eligibility

To be eligible to enroll into the Dual Credit/Concurrent Enrollment Program a student must have completed the 10th grade, met minimum passing standards on the TAKS test, be classified as a junior, follow the Recommended Graduation Plan or Distinguished Achievement Program, be a full-time high school student, pass the THEA or COMPASS test, and have a good record in the following areas.

- **Attendance:** The student must not have had excessive absences in the semester previous to the enrollment period. (90% Rule applies) (Texas Education Code [TEC], Chapter 25 Rule 092)
- **Discipline:** The student must not have had severe discipline problems in the semester previous to the enrollment period. (ISS / AEC / Boot Camp) (TEC Chapter 37 Rule 124)
- **Grades:** The student must have passed all of his/her classes, including college courses, in the semester previous to the enrollment period.

Students meeting the high school requirements will receive a Dual Credit Approval Form and a Dual Credit Guidebook from their high school counselor before applying to the Dual Credit Program. The approval form must be signed by the student, a parent/guardian, a high school counselor, and the high school principal before meeting with the college counselor. The Dual Credit Guidebook Receipt Form, the last page in the guidebook, must be removed and signed by the student and a parent/guardian when applying for the Dual Credit Program. The Dual Credit Approval Form and Guidebook Receipt Form must be presented to the college counselor before registering for college classes. The registration process will be discussed later.

**All dual credit high school students are concurrently enrolled,
but not all concurrently enrolled students are dual credit.**



Each student is responsible for turning-in forms, payment of tuition and fees, buying books, and providing their own transportation to and from Brazosport College.

Rules and Procedures

1. Students must complete the 10th grade, meet minimum passing standards on the 10th grade TAKS test, follow the Recommended Graduation Plan or Distinguished Achievement Program, and be classified as a junior.
2. Students must have a good attendance record, no failing grades and no discipline problems during the previous semester, as determined by the high school counselor's professional judgment, before registering for college classes.
3. Students must request college courses when selecting classes for the next school year.
4. Students must complete the Dual Credit Student Approval Form and submit it to Mr. Holcombe.
5. Students must complete the online application, view the online New Student Orientation video if taking college classes for the first time and complete the online Survey.
6. Students must take an approved Texas Success Initiative test as soon as possible, unless exempt, and have their scores reported to Brazosport College by the following dates:
 - August 15th for the fall semester
 - Dec. 15th for the spring semester
 - May 15th for Summer Session I and II (SSI and SSII)

Failure to submit test scores by the deadlines may delay or prevent registration.

7. Students must complete the following college forms before enrolling in college classes.
 - Brazosport College Online Application for Admission
 - Early Admission/Dual Credit Program Form
8. Students must bring completed forms, signed by a parent and the student, to Mr. Holcombe.
9. Students must confirm enrollment in college classes by providing the high school counselor with a proof of payment statement (green sheet) from the college.
10. Students must attend college classes. Persistent non-attendance of college classes is considered truancy by the high school and will be treated as such. The college has an attendance policy in which the student may be withdrawn from the class by the instructor if the student misses 3 – 5 regular daytime classes or 1 – 2 evening classes, depending on the instructor. The college also sends a progress report to the high school periodically, and reports all students who are failing or withdrawn. It is very important not to miss class. If a student must miss because of some uncontrollable circumstance, the student must contact the instructor as soon as possible.
11. Students with attendance problems and/or failing grades will be called in to discuss their circumstances with their counselor.
12. Students will not be allowed to withdraw from a college course without special permission from the high school counselor and college counselor. If, for some unforeseen circumstance, a student must withdraw from a college class, he/she must fill-out a Class Drop/Withdrawal Form and have it signed by the college counselor before being withdrawn from the course. Forms can be picked up in Mr. Holcombe's office.
13. Students must check-in with the Office of the Principal when attending another high school for college classes. While attending college classes on a high school campus, students will conform to all rules and regulations of that school. Students must immediately check out at the principal's office when the college class is dismissed.
14. Students must be aware of **deadlines** – new student orientation, TSI testing, registration, payment of tuition and fees, financial aid, withdrawing from a class, transcripts, and attendance.

***Students who are not THEA exempt by TAAS, TAKS, SAT or ACT will need to score 270 on the THEA test to take college economics, chemistry, math, or physics.

Testing Requirements

In order to take academic classes at any public college or university in Texas, students must take or be exempt from the **THEA or COMPASS**. Students are exempt if they have the following scores on the TAKS, SAT, or ACT.

***Partial exemptions for Math or English are available with exams taken after April 1, 2004.
Please contact a counselor for more information about exemptions.***

If a student is not exempt and wants to take an academic class, he/she can register for an approved TSI test either by mail, with a form from the guidance office, or by calling **(979) 230-3040** to register for a **THEA Quick test or COMPASS test** at Brazosport College. For emergency situations, there is also a Computer Administered THEA (C.A.T.) test available, which gives immediate results, but has a larger fee. Call 230-3040 to schedule a THEA Quick test or contact Mr. Holcombe to find out how to register for the THEA test.

If a student is taking a **technical course**, such as welding, computer, electricity, etc., a THEA or COMPASS test may not be required. However, testing may be required for some advanced technical classes. Dual credit technical courses requires students to pass, at least, one section of TAKS or one section of THEA or COMPASS out of reading, writing or math.

All necessary testing must be completed by the deadlines listed on page 5.

New Student Orientation

Brazosport College requires that all first-time college students must view the online New Student Orientation Video. This orientation consists of a video about the services the college offers to help students succeed. If a student will be a first-time college student he/she must view the orientation video before registering for college classes.

Students with a broadband (cable, DSL) connection to the Internet can view the online Orientation video and survey by clicking on the Student Orientation button on the Brazosport College website.

New students also will be required to attend an "On Campus" New Student Orientation before first class day. Orientation sessions will be scheduled when students register for classes.

Orientations are held before each semester at Brazosport College. Students may register for orientation by calling 230-3040. Once you have viewed the online orientation, see Mr. Holcombe to sign-up for college classes. Remember that students will not be allowed to register for classes without New Student Orientation.

Orientation is Mandatory!

The Registration Process

1. When students discuss course selection with their high school counselor for the next year, they must inform their counselor of an interest in taking a college course. On the high school Course Selection Form, students must indicate the college class to be taken next school year.
2. Complete the Brazosport College online application at <http://www.applytexas.org>, and then complete the online survey and online orientation video.
3. Pick up a Dual Credit Approval Form and a Dual Credit Guidebook from the college counselor. Submit the signed approval form and guidebook receipt form to the college counselor before picking up a Brazosport College Early Enrollment/Dual Credit Program Form.
4. Take the **THEA or COMPASS test**, if not exempt or waived (see page 7 for TSI test exemption information), as soon as possible, and have scores reported by **August 15th** for the fall semester (see page 5 for testing deadlines).
5. Attend a **New Student Orientation** if this is the first college course the student has taken. Students who have already attended Orientation do not have to attend another; this is for new students, only.
6. Turn in the Early Admission/Dual Credit Program Form, the Dual Credit Student Approval Form, and a Dual Credit Guidebook Receipt Form, to the college counselor, Mr. Holcombe. He will assist students in completing the registration process.
7. When students pick up their high school schedules in the fall, they **must verify** that the requested college classes are correct. If there are any changes needed, please notify the high school and college counselors, immediately.
8. Students will **confirm** college enrollment by providing the high school counselor with a proof of payment statement (**green sheet**) from Brazosport College. Students may be placed into high school classes if they do not provide this confirmation.

Financial Aid for Dual Credit Students

Recently, approved changes in the eligibility requirements for financial aid have been extended to high school students. Students enrolling in the Concurrent Enrollment Program can apply for aid through the Financial Aid Office at Brazosport College.

Students must meet FAFSA eligibility requirements to receive the Texas Public Education Grant (TPEG) funds for tuition, fees, and textbooks. Students can receive up to \$250.00 for each semester they are enrolled in dual credit college courses. Students must enroll in at least three (3) college credit hours, one (1) college course, each semester they request aid.

Grants are available to students on a first come, first served basis. All necessary paperwork must be completed and processed prior to registration. Check the financial aid calendar for dates and deadlines before applying for a TPEG.

Contact the Financial Aid Office at Brazosport College for assistance with the financial aid application process.

Each Semester Requires Registration and Payment of Tuition and Fees

High School Schedule

Some Dual Credit courses are taught on the high school campus. Counselors will inform students which classes will be offered as part of the high school schedule. Students must request Dual Credit courses when they pre-register for high school classes in the spring. If the requirements for taking Dual Credit courses are not fulfilled by the deadline, the regular high school course will be placed in the students' schedule. Be sure to check the deadlines (page 5) when requesting college classes.

Some Dual Credit classes are not offered as a part of the high school schedule. Students may get special approval from the counselor and principal to leave the high school campus to attend a college class on another campus or at Brazosport College. Evening courses also could be taken on the students' own time.

Schedules are final once high school classes begin



Grade Point Average (GPA)

When Columbia High School receives the grade report from Brazosport College, the college level course is typed on the student's high school transcript with the symbol code of "D" to denote it was a Dual Credit course.

Beginning with the graduating class of 2006, all college level dual credit courses will be calculated into the high school GPA for class ranking and transcribed as the actual number grade. Most college level courses will carry the grade point weight of 1.10. See page 6 for course equivalents.

Transfer of Credits

The state of Texas has set up a system of Core Curriculum in which every public college and university must accept as part of its Core Curriculum any transfer class that has been identified as part of the Core Curriculum of the previous institution.

Most other college credits will transfer to senior colleges and universities in Texas, except for courses with a grade of “D”. Some colleges may accept one or two “D’s”, but most will not accept them. Before transferring credits, students should check with the college that they are planning to attend. Students should study carefully the degree requirements of the senior college they plan to transfer and arrange a program of work based on this study.

“If a student successfully completes the 45 semester credit hour core curriculum at Brazosport College, that block of courses is transferable to any other Texas public institution of higher education and must be substituted for the receiving institution’s core curriculum. A student shall receive academic credit for each of the courses transferred and may not be required to take additional core curriculum courses at the receiving institution unless the Texas Higher Education Coordination Board has approved a larger core curriculum at that institution.

A student who transfers to another institution of higher education without completing the Brazosport College core curriculum shall receive academic credit within the core curriculum of the receiving institution for each of the courses that the student has successfully completed in the Brazosport College core curriculum.” – see the [Statewide Transferability of Brazosport College Core Curriculum brochure](#)

Standards of Student Conduct

Brazosport College assumes that students eligible to perform on the college level are familiar with the ordinary rules governing proper conduct and that they will observe these rules as a matter of training and habit. The institution accepts the concept that where its interests as an academic community are involved, the special authority of the institution should be asserted.

Breaches of Conduct

The college regards the following as illustrations of misconduct that will result in action by the appropriate college authority. Notation of disciplinary action imposed upon students shall be made a part of the student's permanent file in the Office of the Dean of Student Services. Misconduct shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

1. **Scholastic dishonesty** – including, but not limited to, cheating on a test, plagiarism, and collusion. **Cheating** on a test includes: copying from another student's test paper; using test materials not authorized by the person administering the test; knowingly using, buying, selling, stealing, or soliciting, in whole or in part, the contents of an un-administered test or a test that may be used again; and the unauthorized transporting or removal, in whole or in part, of the contents of an un-administered test or a test that may be used again. **Plagiarism** shall be defined as the appropriating, buying, receiving as a gift, or obtaining by any means, another's work and the unacknowledged submission or incorporation of it in one's own written work. **Collusion** shall be defined as the unauthorized collaboration with another person in preparing written work for fulfillment of course requirements. Students determined to be guilty of cheating, plagiarism, or collusion shall be subject to dismissal from the class with a failing grade. A second offense may be cause for suspension from college.
2. Interference with teaching, research, administration, or the college's subsidiary responsibilities through "disorderly conduct" or "disruptive behavior."
3. Unauthorized use of college property.
4. Refusal to provide identification when requested to do so by a college official.
5. Violations of the Penal Statutes of Texas or of the United States.
6. Endangering the health or safety of others including, but not limited to, assault, physical abuse, verbal abuse, threats, intimidation, harassment, or coercion.

The Dean of Student Services shall consider and take appropriate disciplinary action when violation of law, college rules and regulations, and other breaches of conduct by students are reported.

- Complete the online Brazosport College application at applytexas.org
- Complete the Dual Credit Approval Form signed by student, parent, counselor, and/or principal
- Take the THEA or COMPASS test, if applicable
- View the online New Student Orientation video and complete the online Survey.
- Submit applicable test scores unless the student qualifies for an exemption (See page 7)
- Complete an Early Admission/Dual Credit Form, signed by the student and a parent/guardian
- Sign and remove The Dual Credit Guidebook Agreement Receipt Form
- Submit all completed forms and paperwork to Mr. Holcombe for verification and his signature
- Pay Tuition and Fees at Brazosport College, on campus or online
- Go to the BC library for a Student ID card, then go to the IT Help Desk to activate email account
- Buy books and supplies at Brazosport College bookstore
- Bring the college tuition and fees payment receipt (green sheet) to the high school counselor
- Meet with high school counselor to make appropriate schedule changes, if needed
